





As the first female and first African Director-General of the World Trade Organization, she occupies one of the most influential economic platforms in the world, while also extending Nigeria's intellectual footprint and diplomatic clout globally. She was previously the first woman to serve as Nigeria's Finance Minister and also as Nigeria's Foreign Minister.

As the first female spokesperson of the Nigerian Army, she's breaking barriers in military communications and redefining representation within the Armed Services.

As the first female pilot in the Nigerian Navy, Changfe is expanding the boundaries of service and symbolism within Africa's maritime defence space.

26 FACTS ABOUT NIGERIAN WOMEN

1 Wuraola Esan (1960) - First female member of Nigeria's Federal Parliament, breaking barriers at independence.

2 Patricia Etteh (2007) - First and only female Speaker of the Nigerian House of Representatives.

3 Franca Afegbua (1983) - First woman elected to the Nigerian Senate.

4 Virginia Etiaba (2006-2007) - First female governor in Nigerian history, paving the way for future women leaders.

5 Only 20 women serve in the current (10th) National Assembly: 4 of the 109 Senate seats (2.7%) and 16 of the 360 seats in the House of Representatives (4.7%).

Ireti Kingibe (2023) - Unseated a long-serving senator who had held his seat since 2011, proving women can win competitive elections.

8

Captain Josephine Okwuekeleke Tolefe (1960) - First female commissioned officer in the Nigerian Army.

10

27.9% female participation in peace support operations - 10% above the UN's 17% benchmark, showing Nigeria's leadership in peacekeeping.

Lieutenant Colonel Onyinyechi Appolonia Anele - First female acting Director of Army Public Relations (2025).

National Gender Policy - Nigeria advocates for 35% affirmative action for women in elective and appointive positions which is above the global 30% Beijing declaration.

Major General Aderonke Kale - First female Major General in Nigeria and West Africa; commanded the Nigerian Army Medical Corps (1994-1996).

11

In 2011, the first female Regular Combatants Cadets were admitted to the Nigerian Defence Academy, opening combat roles to women.



13 Army Warrant Officer Hajara Egbunu - First female Infantry Corps soldier to attain Army Warrant Officer rank (2025).

15 Blessing Liman - First female fighter plane pilot commissioned in the Nigeria Air Force.

17 Amina Mohammed - First Nigerian and first African woman to serve as UN Deputy Secretary-General, championing sustainable development globally.

19 83% of Nigerian women consider themselves entrepreneurs - far higher than the regional average of 51% across other continents.

14 Flying Officer Tolulope Arotile - First female combat helicopter pilot in the Nigerian Air Force. May her soul continue to rest in peace.

16 Franca Afegbua (1983) - First woman elected to the Nigerian Senate.

18 Blessing Oborududu - Most successful Nigerian female wrestler of all time, and winner in 2021 of Nigeria's first (and only!) Olympic medal in Wrestling (Silver).



20 40% of new businesses created in Nigeria are female-led, demonstrating women's entrepreneurial drive.

22 In 2026, 8 out of Nigeria's 28 commercial banks have women CEOs.

24 Women constitute 49.95% of Nigeria's population of over 206 million, representing massive untapped potential.

26 Two decades later, Funmilayo Ransome-Kuti led the 1948 Women's Revolt against unjust taxation, continuing a tradition of women's activism that continues today.

21 30% of registered entrepreneurial businesses in Nigeria are owned by women.

23 Women farmers make up 70% of Nigeria's agricultural workforce and produce 60% of the food Nigerians depend on.

25 In 1929, women in the Owerri and Calabar provinces began a historic protest seeking the abolition of the warrant chief system, and an end to unfair taxes. It was the first major revolt by women in West Africa.

Eat out at a woman-owned restaurant. Lagos, Abuja, PH – they're everywhere if you look.

F

Forgive yourself for something you've been carrying. Women are world-class at guilt. Put it down today.

G

Google a Nigerian woman who made history. Funmilayo Ransome-Kuti. Margaret Ekpo. Flora Nwapa. Know the heroes that came before you.

H

Hug a significant woman in your life. Or call her. Or send her a voice note that isn't asking for money.

I

Invest in something. A mutual fund, a Treasury Bill, a side business. Financial independence is feminist.

J

Journal about the woman who shaped you most. Write it down before the memory softens.

K

Keep a promise you made to yourself. That course, that gym routine, that boundary you said you'd enforce.

L

Listen to a woman today without interrupting, advising, or fixing. Just listen.



M

Mentor a younger woman. Even one conversation over lunch can shift someone's entire trajectory.

N

Nominate a woman for an award, a board seat, or a speaking opportunity. Women get overlooked because nobody puts their name forward.

O

Organise a small gathering of women you admire. No agenda. Just food, conversation, and honesty.

P

Pay a woman what she's worth. If you run a business and you know there's a gap, close it today.

Q

Quit one habit that drains your energy. You don't need a new year to start over. Today works.

R

Recommend a woman for that job, that contract, that opportunity you heard about. Be the bridge.

S

Say thank you to a woman who helped you and never got the credit. A text is enough. A handwritten note is better.
